1. Pickleball has been the fastest growing sport in America for the last 5 years.

TRUE. Pickleball continues to dominate headlines maintaining its status as the fastest growing sport in America. Top-tier media outlets like *The New York Times, Wall Street Journal, CNBC, Sports Business Journal, Forbes, and Sports Illustrated* extensively covered the sport's growth and impact.

2. The Heritage Palms Pickleball Club has grown nearly 400% in the last 8 years.

FALSE. The Club has actually grown 427% since March 2017 when there were 42 members. Each year our Pickleball Club continues to steadily grow and there is no end in sight. There were 222 paid members this season with 52 new members and 170 returning members.

5. Pickleball is the third requested country club sport amenity behind golf and bocce.

FALSE. While golf's popularity soared across the country, it was actually the No. 2 participation sport in terms of growth at many country clubs, resorts and golf course communities.

Tennis has long been a natural complement to golf, but it's pickleball that's seen an explosion of adopters in recent years – both in terms of participants and facilities adding courts. (Source: Forbe's magazine). We suspect Bocce is growing too :-).

6. Pickleball is a very difficult sport to learn, but keeping score is very easy, especially when stacking.

FALSE. Pickleball is an easy sport to learn, but keeping score is tricking. Just ask any player what a score of 2-2-2 means. Players need to start in a specific position when they are serving/receiving depending on how many points they have. Stacking involves players starting in the correct spot, but then moving after the first shot. Now that's a brain twister!

7. Pickleball is a passing fad and will fade away like racquetball did.

FALSE. Pickleball's popularity is not just a passing trend; it's a testament to its simplicity, accessibility, and ability to bring people together across age groups and backgrounds.
